A practical, functional and introductory study of music software, hardware and media in music, including uses in traditional and contemporary music and worship, and music teaching settings. Includes basic instruction in music writing programs. This course includes class and lab instruction. This course fulfills the general education computer requirement for music major/minors. **III. REQUIRED MATERIALS**
