C. Digital Story

1. Student will design a digital story using Windows Movie Maker or I Movie. The story will teach about prevention of heart attacks and strokes. It will also present a plan for individuals to be victorious in this problem. It will answer some of the following questions.
 - A. Why is low blood pressure important in this battle?
 - B. What techniques will lower blood pressure?
 - C. What results will prolonged high blood pressure have?
 - D. How do medicines lower blood pressure?
 - E. What does nicotine do to blood pressure?
 - F. How does a high fat diet affect the heart?
 - G. How does exercise affect the heart?
 - H. Describe three medical procedures that can be used to prevent heart attacks and strokes?
 - I. Describe what occurs during a heart bypass surgery?
2. Digital Storytelling is the practice of using computer-based tools to tell stories. As with traditional storytelling, most digital stories focus on a specific topic and contain a particular point of view. However, as the name implies, digital stories usually contain some mixture of computer-based images, text, recorded audio narration, video clips and/or music. Digital stories can vary in length, but most of the stories used in education typically last 10 minutes. The topics that are used in Digital Storytelling range from personal tales to the recounting of historical events, from exploring life in one's own community to the explaining why obesity is out of control in our country.
3. Students will do the storytelling assignment in pairs. Tutorials about how to use the computer programs necessary will take place during class time. Final project will be due January 20.
