DESCRIPTION

A Christian approach to the study of human growth. This course deals with the individual's physical, intellectual, social, emotional, moral, and spiritual development through childhood, adolescence, and adulthood.

This is a blended class, meaning that both campus and online students take this class together. Campus students attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. All interaction and assignments for campus and online students are done in the online classroom.

REQUIREMENTS

A. **READING:** The reading assignments listed in the tentative class schedule will prepare you for class discussion. Read each chapter completely and thoroughly, then turn in a one page single spaced typewritten summary for each chapter of the textbook (one page for three chapters in Dobson's book). Your report should contain an analysis and evaluation of the content of each chapter and your thoughts regarding the classroom discussions.

B. ASSESSING A HUMAN GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT ISSUE:

Select an area of human growth and development that you wish to investigate, and type a seven page Turabian style report.

Research a variety of perspectives regarding your chosen topic (look at popular press, Christian perspectives, and scholarly reports).

Sources: You will need **at least 8 pages of text and 8 sources** to earn an "A". Be sure to cite all sources with footnotes and full source citations at the end of the paper (Turabian style).

Summarize the arguments for each perspective, present your personal perspective, and evaluate all perspectives from a biblical worldview.

This report is due the sixth week of the course.

C. CROSS CULTURAL INVESTIGATION

Identify a culture different from your own and research how they approach human growth and development in their society. You need to address at least 5 elements of the culture, with at least 3 of these explored in depth. This paper should contain at least seven pages of text with five sources. Consider such topics as:

Who provides child care—mother, father, grandparents, non-family persons, sibling, corporations, collective, etc.

Differences in treatment of children, and expectations for their futures based upon their gender.

What children are expected to learn on their own and what is expressly taught.

Stages children are expected to go through, and at what ages they transition to each stage and when childhood ends.

Rites of passage.

Independence and dependence training.

Educational expectations and opportunities.

Vocational expectations and opportunities (child labor and/or chores)

Children's attitudes toward elders and vice versa.

Special status of children, such as mini-adult, weak and fragile, venerated, etc.

Evidence of how highly or lowly children are valued.
 Anything else that interest you and seems relevant.
 This report is due the first day of December.

D. EXAMINATIONS: There will be three exams.

METHODS

Lectures, discussions, reports, reading.

Students missing more than 4 class sessions automatically receive an “EA” (excessive absence) or failing grade for the course. Online students will be marked present for each class session after they watch the class session video and send the instructor an email giving him a brief summary of what was discussed in the video.

In general, you will be assessed on how well you; read carefully and analytically, seriously reflect on concepts and ideas, plan and carry out assignments in a timely and scholarly manner, discuss and participate in class discussions, and write clearly and thoughtfully.

Grading: Late assignments will significantly lower your semester grade.
