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I. DESCRIPTION

A study of angels including the doctrine of holy angels, Satan, and demons; a study of the Church, its beginning, nature, importance, officers, and ordinances; a study of the doctrine of prophecy and predictive revelation, both fulfilled and unfulfilled, with emphasis on the nature of the Rapture, the Tribulation, and the Millennial Kingdom. (Prerequisites: COM110 or concurrent enrollment in COM110)

This is a blended class, meaning that both campus and online students take this class together. Campus students attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. All interaction and assignments for campus and online students are done in the online classroom.

II. OBJECTIVES

A. General competencies to be achieved. The student will:

1. Acquire an understanding of the theological doctrines studied in this course. (PLO: 1 – 5) [A: A, B, C]
2. Obey the triune God to overcome the evil one. (PLO: 1 – 5) [A: A, B, C]
3. Worship and serve God in the life of the local church. (PLO: 1 – 5) [A: A, B, C]
4. Live a holy life knowing that Christ could return at any moment. (PLO: 1 – 5) [A: A, B, C]

- B. Specific competencies to be achieved. The student will:
1. Understand the nature and purpose of angels, both elect and evil.
 2. Understand the distinctives of the church.
 3. Understand and summarize the future events in biblical prophecy.
 4. Defend a pretribulational, dispensational view of eschatology.
 5. Know the key passages and concepts that relate to each doctrine.
 6. All of these objectives relate to PLOs 1 – 5 and to Assignments A – C.

III. MATERIALS

A. BIBLE

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB), English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (paraphrases and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a translation or version.
